Message from the Principal:

Principal's Notes

NCEA Results

NZQA has now released the preliminary **roll-based** and the **entry-based** (or participation-based) 2011 NCEA results. Both sets of data indicate impressive results for Western Springs College. Parents may be interested to note the small WSC differentials between the two sets of data compared to those for NZ Decile 8 schools overall.

Note: **Participation-based** (or entry-based) data shows the percentages of participating candidates achieving NCEA Levels 1, 2, and 3, and University Entrance. **Roll-based** data shows percentages of students on the 2011 1 July roll achieving NCEA Levels 1, 2, 3 and U. E.

The reason that NZQA provide both sets of data is that in the past schools have been accused of manipulating participation-based data by controlling or limiting student access to NCEA assessments in order to massage results. Accordingly, it seems that it is warranted to analyse both sets of results.

The most outstanding result is arguably also the most important: WSC's entry-based **U. E. pass rate** is 17% above the national same decile (8) average; our roll-based result is 21.8% above. In relation to these comparisons, note that the national Level 3 and U. E. entry-based and roll-based differentials are twice that of WSC.

With regard to **Certificate Endorsements** we are pleased that we have exceeded our targets for *Excellence* and *Merit* for Levels 1 and 2 – 18.4% of Level 2 students gained an *Excellence* endorsement.

Note that as yet **Scholarship** results are not available.

We will prepare and release a comprehensive analysis of results, including gender and ethnic group data, for publication on the WSC website when the NZQA results are finalised next month.

English News

Greetings to all –welcome to the 2012 year in English. It's an exciting year for our department as we implement the alignment of NCEA Level Two with the New Zealand Curriculum. Whilst there is a great deal to cover as the year gets underway, this entry largely deals with Year Nine, Level Two Reading standards and how writing standards work at Levels One and Two

If you are a parent of a Year Nine student you should have received an introductory letter providing an overview of the course. Much of Term One will be spent gathering diagnostic information on your child's strengths and needs as a learner, both for the English learning Area and the entire school. The Reciprocal Teaching programme introduced in 2011 in partnership with the Learning Centre will continue this year.

We will be asTTle testing Year Nine in Week Three and gathering more data in Week Four with PATs. Hopefully your child will share his or her asTTle data with you. If not, please email me (fergusons@wsc.school.nz) and I will send your child's Individual Learning Pathway.

This year we are placing a great deal of emphasis upon Personal Reading at Years Nine, Ten and Twelve. Ali Geursen and Belinda Develter will be promoting and running an online book club. Please note that the blogs will be confined to the school community for reasons of privacy and e-safety. We urge you to encourage your child to participate in sharing his or her reading through blogging. If you have any queries please contact Ali (geursena@wsc.school.nz) or Belinda (develterb@wsc.school.nz).

Debating is upon us, with Belinda Develter again co-ordinating the teams. We hope you will encourage your child to participate in a 'sport' that builds skill and confidence in argument and communication of ideas.

On the subject of Personal Reading, we would like to alert parents to the fact that students have a choice as to which Level Two Reading standard they undertake. Here is a potted summary of each, with their respective benefits and caveats:

91104 Analyse significant connections across texts, with supporting evidence: this is the (more demanding) Level Two version of the standard students completed in Year 11 last year. It requires responses to four texts during Terms One and Two (three of which can be studied in class) and writing a report analysing how they present conflict. At least one text –a novel- must be selected and read independently. This standard fulfils the UE Literacy requirement for Reading. **91104 Significant Connections** offers the benefits of being familiar (as all students did the Level One version last year). It is heavily 'scaffolded' and supported. It is attainable by all students. It may, however, not be to the liking of students who enjoy the freedom of working independently and would welcome the opportunity to depart from the texts studied in class.

OR

91106 Form personal responses to independently chosen texts: This personal reading standard requires students to outline a topic focus then select, independently read and respond to at least six texts. Texts cannot include those studied in class. Students must form developed personal responses to each of the texts and support these with evidence. Of the six texts selected, at **least four** must be **written texts, two of which must be extended texts**. The remaining **two texts** can be **visual, oral, or written**. This standard also fulfils the UE Literacy requirement for Reading. It would suit students who are (a) confident readers and (b) enjoy the freedom to pursue their own line of enquiry. **The prerequisites are:** Excellence in 90852 in 2011 (or at the discretion of HOD English); a short written brief outlining your focus and parental consent.

91106 Personal Responses offers freedom and choice of reading and research, allowing students to pursue their own line of study within the English programme. There are a great number of options in both potential topics and reading material. Students must, however, be sufficiently organised to sustain their effort over six independently chosen and read texts. There is an element of 'at your own risk' with this standard: students will not have the benefit of anything like the teacher support and guidance they get for 91104 Significant Connections. Self-management and engagement will determine level of success.

Finally, I would like to remind parents how writing is assessed in English at NCEA Levels One, Two and Three. Level One and Two students construct a writing portfolio. Each Level One student will then choose the best piece to be polished and submitted in Term Three. At Level Two the entire portfolio is polished and submitted.

Pieces for NCEA writing standards **can only be crafted at school to ensure authenticity**. Students cannot, under any circumstances, draft outside of school any work that will be submitted for a writing portfolio. We would greatly appreciate it if students get this message at home as well as from us at school.

Junior Mathematics

Welcome back!

Now that our students are getting settled into school, I would like to remind parents and carers that scientific calculators are an essential item in the classroom. They are not included in the stationery pack but can be purchased at The Warehouse or Warehouse Stationery for around \$20. In year 10 your students will be studying Trigonometry, and are not able to do this topic without using these calculators.

Year 9 Mathematics Banding:

At Springs, we band the students in Mathematics in term 1: we not only look at prior assessment data, but also use teacher assessment to place the students in the classes most suited to their abilities. The banding process starts by analysing the data we receive from the feeder schools, and comparing this to their current PAT data. We then add into the mix the results from class tests and the statistics project, and discuss the final banding list as a department. This ensures that the vast majority (there are always a few anomalies) are correctly placed. When we are unsure of a student's placing, we enlist help from the learning centre to individually interview and assess the student. It is a very long, thorough process, and we have been very successful in matching the students' needs to their classes.



With regards to the banding, we have an accelerated, two middle band and one paced classes. I am often asked what the difference is between the classes, so I shall try and explain, briefly. All of our junior classes follow the National Curriculum, aiming for students to achieve up to level 5 by the end of year 10. We reinforce skills that are already known and fine tune them so that the students will be able to further extend their knowledge in year 11. The accelerated classes are given the opportunity to investigate areas requiring higher order thinking to develop their problem solving skills, but remain within the same programme of study that the other students follow. The paced band follows the same programme, but with an emphasis on achieving within their level. They do not receive as much extension into the merit style questions as the middle band may be exposed to. Where appropriate, students may be

withdrawn from class to work in small groups in the Learning Centre. All of the students sit the same exams at the end of the academic year, and the assessment data is then used to organise classes in year 10. So, for example, a middle band student who has worked hard and achieved well in all of the topics studied may be placed in an accelerated year 10 class.

Banding will be completed by the end of week 5, and your student will be given a note informing them of their new class and new teacher. Once they have been introduced to their teacher, they will come home with the note for you to sign, and an information sheet detailing the course outline and an assessment timetable. Please ensure that you read through this with your student so that he or she is very clear what the expectations are for the year.

- showing tolerance of others' differences.

It offers parents guidance and support when their teenager's behaviour is unacceptable and disruptive within the family, school and community.

Toughlove provides groups for parents who meet weekly for support, facilitated by parents trained in the programme who have been in your shoes and know how you feel.
